Welcome to issue 1 of our newsletter, which is aimed at people who have been affected by a brain injury.

About us

The NIHR Brain Injury HTC is one of eight national Healthcare Technology Cooperatives (HTCs) funded by the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR).



The NIHR Brain Injury HTC works with industry to develop new medical devices, healthcare technologies and technology-dependent interventions to improve treatment and quality of life for patients with brain injuries. Can a new computer game help people recover from brain injury?

After a brain injury, people may have difficulty remembering things, with language and with paying attention. Researchers at Cambridge University are developing a new computer game to try to help with recovering these abilities.

The idea is that, by playing the new game, people with a brain injury will be able train themselves to keep their concentration, and to improve their reasoning and problem solving.

The game will run on a hand-held iPad so that it can be used anywhere.

We are looking for people to help with the development of the game. We are asking people who live near Cambridge to travel to Addenbrookes Hospital in Cambridge, to play the game and give feedback to the team. The visit should take only one hour and reasonable travel expenses will be reimbursed.

If you are over 18, recovering from a traumatic brain injury that occurred between one and six years ago and would like to try out the game, please contact:
